





Project Update:

Work is expected to begin in the next week on renovations to Lyons Hall. This includes new interior lighting, repainting the gym ceiling, and work on the new gym concession stand. We are also working towards beginning electrical work around the church.

OLL Campus Security Plan

Over the past year, the Safety and Security Committee has been hard at work determining the safety and security needs of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish and School. After meeting with Parish and School leaders, they have developed a plan to address a variety of needs. This plan has been presented, amended, and approved through the insights and work of the Facilities Committee, Finance Committee, and Parish Pastoral Council. These safety and security upgrades will work alongside the *Sharing our Faith*, *Securing our Future* Capital Campaign additions. Below you will find a brief summary of several key components that have been included in this plan.

- **Security Cameras** Cameras will be installed on buildings throughout campus to assist in maintaining visibility. No cameras will be installed directly on the church but rather on poles in several locations while maintaining the aesthetic look of future exterior church lighting.
- Door Access Controls Exterior doors will be upgraded to include door access
 control components such as keys pads and a badge system. This will help keep
 track of who is using our facilities.
- Phone / Paging System The phone system will be upgraded to a more modern and reliable system. Each classroom will have a phone installed for quick contact if needed. Our 1950s paging system will also be upgraded and will include an emergency messaging system.
- **Gates** New gates will be installed at the parking lot entrances and exits as well as next to the gym alley to the back parking lot for when students are playing on the playground.
- Classroom Doors Classroom doors will be updated with solid doors and new hardware made for security.

Funding to complete this plan is estimated to be \$200,000. We have received two James P. Scott Endowment Grants from the Archdiocese totaling \$60,000. We have also received assistance from the Hare Family Charitable Trust of \$5,140. We are working to find additional funding through grants and other sources.
