Communion Calls: Please call the parish office to arrange Communion calls for the home-bound.



Pastor's Corner

My dear brothers and sisters of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish,

The "Lourdes Word" has just come in electronic form, and will soon be mailed. The focus this Fall was "Favorite Saints." It is well worth reading!

As I write, it is October 11, the Memorial of Pope Saint John XXII. It was he who inaugurated the Second Vatican Council (VCII).

October 11, 1962. I was 10 years old when VCII commenced. Fifth grade. It was a rather vague event at that age. It was noted in religion class, with an urging by Sister Joseph Catherine to pray for the bishop's meeting in Rome.

By the time I reached high school (Latin School), the council was in its third session, coming to a conclusion a year later on December 8, 1965.

For some, the commencement was filled with hope; for others, uncertainty; and still for others, dismay, even anger.

The wrangling over how to express truth to the Church and the world was tectonic.

Over the centuries of Christianity, Councils are noted for interchanges that seem (and are) contentious, beginning with the First Council of Jerusalem (Acts of the Apostles). Passion and the Spirit are writ large with every such gathering.

60 years have passed. The opening remarks of Saint John XXIII yet have the ring of truth and insight. In particular, his speaking to "the unity of the Christian and Human Family".

Here follow his words. (Italics are for emphasis on my part.)

"The Church's solicitude to promote and defend truth derives from the fact that, according to the plan of God, who wills all [people] to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth (1 Tim. 2:4), [people] without the assistance of the whole of revealed doctrine cannot reach a complete and firm unity of minds, with which are associated true peace and eternal salvation.

"Unfortunately, the entire Christian family has not yet fully attained this visible unity in truth.

"The Catholic Church, therefore, considers it her duty to work actively so that there may be fulfilled the great mystery of that unity, which Jesus Christ invoked with fervent prayer from His heavenly Father on the eve of His sacrifice. She rejoices in peace, knowing well that she is intimately associated with that prayer, and then exults greatly at seeing that invocation extend its efficacy with salutary fruit, even among those who are outside her fold.

"Indeed, if one considers well this same unity which Christ implored for His Church, it seems to shine, as it were, with a triple ray of beneficent supernal light: namely, the unity of Catholics among themselves, which must always be kept exemplary and most firm; the unity of prayers and ardent desires with which those Christians separated from this Apostolic See aspire to be united with us; and the unity in esteem and respect for the Catholic Church which animates those who follow non-Christian religions.

"In this regard, it is a source of considerable sorrow to see that the greater part of the human race - although all [people] who are born were redeemed by the blood of Christ - does not yet participate in those sources of divine grace which exist in the Catholic Church. Hence the Church, whose light illumines all, whose strength of supernatural unity redounds to the advantage of all humanity, is rightly described in these beautiful words of St. Cyprian:

'The Church, surrounded by divine light, spreads her rays over the entire earth. This light, however, is one and unique, and shines everywhere without causing any separation in the unity of the body. She extends her branches over the whole world. By her fruitfulness she sends ever farther afield her rivulets. Nevertheless, the head is always one, the origin one, for she is the one mother, abundantly fruitful. We are born of her, are nourished by her milk, we live of her spirit" (De Catholicae Eccles. Unitate, 5).'

"Venerable brothers [and sisters], such is the aim of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, which, while bringing together the Church's best energies and striving to have [people] welcome more favorably the good tidings of salvation, prepares, as it were, and consolidates the path toward that unity of mankind which is required as a necessary foundation...that the earthly city may be brought to the resemblance of that heavenly city where truth reigns, charity is the law, and whose extent is eternity (Cf. St. Augustine, Epistle 138, 3)."

Please God, 60 years on, may we continue to pursue the path and truths set out in the 16 documents of VCII.

The Truth About **Abortion**Ben's lives. & **Women's Health**

Abortion does not save women's lives.

Abortion is the direct and intentional. killing of a child in the womb. Abortion is never medically necessary. It does not treat or solve any pregnancy-related complication.

Outlawing abortion will not affect treatment for miscarriage.

Treatment for miscarriage and abortion is not the same thing.

There is a complete moral and legal difference between losing a child through miscarriage and intentionally taking the life of a child. In the tragic case of miscarriage, surgery may be necessary—and is an ethical treatment—to remove the remains of an unborn child who has <u>already died</u>

While the same surgery is done to perform an abortion, abortions impose this procedure on a *living* child with the intention of ending his or her life.

Women can get the lifesaving treatments they need—without abortion.

In rare cases, and in the absence of better alternatives, life-threatening maternal health conditions may require interventions that **indirectly** and **unintentionally** lead to the death of an unborn child. **Abortion restrictions will not prevent women from receiving these treatments.**

When the lives of mother and child are in immediate danger, the goal is to fight to save both patients.

Effective treatments exist that seek to save the life of the mother and never to intentionally harm her

When a woman's life is at risk in pregnancy, preterm delivery may be used as a lifesaving medical intervention to preserve the life of both mother and child.

Ectopic pregnancies

result when an embryo implants outside the uterus—often in the fallopian tube. Sadly, such embryos cannot survive and this condition can pose serious risks to the mother. While ectopic pregnancies sometimes resolve naturally, interventions are often necessary.

When done ethically, treatment for an ectopic pregnancy is not abortion. Ethical interventions include the removal of the damaged fallopian tube containing the embryo or, if embryo death has already occurred, medication can be used to resolve the ectopic pregnancy.

Bottom line: Abortion restrictions never prevent women from receiving life-saving treatment.²
