

Communion Calls: Please call the parish office to arrange Communion calls for the home-bound.



Pastor's Corner

My dear brothers and sisters of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish,

This weekend, we hear of Zacchaeus, the tax collector (wealthy man, extortioner, and hated Roman collaborator) who encounters Jesus' openness and ultimate mercy.

This Jesus changed his plans – we was just passing through Jericho – to stay the night at Zacchaeus' home. Though Zacchaeus, for all intents and purposes, was a "sinner" in the eyes of all his neighbors, Jesus steps into his life. A profound metanoia (conversion, change, in Greek) comes over Zacchaeus at this unexpected openness.

I love this story this small-in-stature guy. His curiosity "just to see Jesus" leads to much more!

That much more has often been put into song. For instance, "Amazing Grace," the song by a former slaver (John Newton), comes to mind.

I would share another such song. The melody is quite familiar. We know it from the hymn "O Little Town of Bethlehem." The words are found in the Liturgy of the Hours, from which I have drawn them.

As you read the words, notice again the openness of Jesus to the needs of the sinner, and one who hungers for his words and for food. Note as well that the sinner is fed with heavenly food, a clear hymnic allusion to the Eucharist. Hum the music as you read, or take up voice and sing the words – praying twice, as St. Augustine once noted. And let the import of the words strike your heart with thanksgiving (the very meaning of "eucharist")!

Jesus, the needy sinner's friend, Command the crowd to sit, Who hungry still on you attend, And nothing have to eat; They hear the word your lips have said, Low at your feet they bow, Distribute now the heavenly bread, And feed their spirits now.

O'erwhelmed with blessings from above, Father, before we taste
These freshest tokens of your love,
We thank you for the past;
Our eyes and hearts to heaven we lift,
And, taught by Jesus, own
That every grace and every gift
Descends from you alone.

The gospel by our Savior blessed Does efficacious prove, The loaves a thousand-fold increased Communicate his love; We banquet on the heavenly bread, When Christ himself imparts, By his disciples' hands conveyed To all believing hearts.



The Truth About **Abortion**en's lives. & **Women's Health**

Abortion does not save women's lives.

Abortion is the **direct** and **intentional** killing of a child in the womb.

Abortion is never medically necessary. It does not treat or solve any pregnancy-related complication.

Outlawing abortion will not affect treatment for miscarriage.

Treatment for miscarriage and abortion is not the same thing.

There is a complete moral and legal difference between losing a child through miscarriage and intentionally taking the life of a child. In the tragic case of miscarriage, surgery may be necessary—and is an ethical treatment—to remove the remains of an unborn child who has *already died*.

While the same surgery is done to perform an abortion, abortions impose this procedure on a *living* child with the **intention** of ending his or her life.

Women can get the lifesaving treatments they need—without abortion.

In rare cases, and in the absence of better alternatives, life-threatening maternal health conditions may require interventions that **indirectly** and **unintentionally** lead to the death of an unborn child. **Abortion restrictions will not prevent women from receiving these treatments.**

When the lives of mother and child are in immediate danger, the goal is to fight to save both patients. Effective treatments exist that seek to save the life of the mother and *never* to intentionally harm her unborn child.

When a woman's life is at risk in pregnancy, preterm delivery may be used as a lifesaving medical intervention to preserve the life of both mother and child.¹

Ectopic pregnancies

result when an embryo implants outside the uterus—often in the fallopian tube. Sadly, such embryos cannot survive and this condition can pose serious risks to the mother. While ectopic pregnancies sometimes resolve naturally, interventions are often necessary.

When done ethically, treatment for an ectopic pregnancy is not abortion. Ethical interventions include the removal of the damaged fallopian tube containing the embryo or, if embryo death has already occurred, medication can be used to resolve the ectopic pregnancy.

Bottom line: Abortion restrictions never prevent women from receiving life-saving treatment.²
