



Pastor's Corner

Dear brothers and sisters of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish,

I am sure that the death of Pope Francis has been on all our minds. This passing has been for me a constant companion this week. It has infused daily activities, prayer, and relationships.

By the time you read this, Pope Francis' body will have been interred at St. Mary Major Basilica in Rome.

Commentators, numerous articles, and social media have weighed in this week, speaking of Pope Francis "legacy."

At the Spring Business Meeting this past Tuesday, Archbishop Thompson noted his response to the question at the press conference. I paraphrase: "Many want to remark upon the Pope's legacy. But the reality is, the focus is the Church's legacy."

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. The Church's legacy in Francis' pontificate could best be summed up: Mercy.

In two volumes, one a reflection on the nature of the Church (The Church of Mercy, 2014), the other a transcript of an interview of Pope Francis soon after he declared an extraordinary Holy Year of mercy (2016), he made clear his vision for the Church.

But his vision was rooted in his predecessors – and Jesus Christ. In the second volume, he quoted several of his most recent predecessors. The following are those quotes.

When John XXIII solemnly opened the Second Vatican Council, he said, "The Bride of Christ prefers to use the medicine of mercy rather than arm herself with the weapons of rigor." In his meditation "Thoughts on Death," the blessed Paul VI revealed the essence of his spiritual life in the synthesis proposed by Saint Augustine: poverty and mercy. "My poverty - Pope Montini wrote - the mercy of God. That I may at least honor who you are, God of infinite bounty, invoking, accepting, and celebrating your sweet mercy."

Saint John Paul II took the notion further with his encyclical *Dives in Misericordia*, in which he affirmed that the Church lives an authentic life when if professes and proclaims mercy, the most amazing attribute of the Creator and Redemptor, and when it leads humanity to the font of mercy. In addition, he instituted the festivity of Holy Mercy, endorsed the figure of Saint Faustina Kowalska, and focused on Jesus' words on mercy.

Pope Benedict XVI also spoke of this in his teachings: "Mercy is in reality the core of the Gospel message; it is the name of God himself, the face with which he revealed himself in the Old Testament and fully in Jesus Christ, incarnation of Creative and Redemptive Love. This love of mercy also illuminates the face of the Church, and is manifested through the Sacraments, in particular that of the Reconciliation, as well as in works of charity, both of community and individuals. Everything that the Church says and does shows that God has mercy for man."

Easter Celebrates Life

"Easter celebrates the victory of life. Christians do not come to Church on Easter simply to congratulate Jesus for rising from the dead. They come in order to touch their own victory over death. In rising, Christ destroyed not only His own death, but ours! He overturned the entire kingdom of death. Death has no more power over Him; nor does it have ultimate power over those who live in Him. - The influence of the Church on the world, therefore, is the influence of a community which already participates in victory over death. That influence moves the structures and choices of society away from death and destruction, and toward the affirmation, in word and deed, of the precious gift of life. It would be a profound distortion of the meaning of Easter if we separate, in thought or deed, our faith in the Resurrection from our efforts to secure justice and respect for every life. - The Church that celebrates Easter also lives Easter. But as St. Augustine once said, we sing "Alleluia," but as we sing we must "keep going" on the arduous journey that is ours."

Facts About Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology 2024-25 2024-25

Saint Meinrad's commitment to priestly formation began in 1857. Over the intervening years, more than 4,000 alumni have become priests. Currently, more than 1,500 Saint Meinrad alumni serve the Church as priests throughout the world.

In addition, nearly 7,000 lay alumni are serving the Church and society in many different vocations. Men and women in lay ministry, both professional and volunteer, have benefited from receiving a quality education at Saint Meinrad.

Saint Meinrad has served the needs of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis for many years. There are 112 active and retired priests of the diocese (including Archbishop Thompson), 68 permanent deacons, 11 religious, and 541 lay people who are alumni of Saint Meinrad.

Saint Meinrad began the 2024-25 school year with an enrollment of 116 seminarians representing 22 dioceses and 6 religious communities. The Archdiocese of Indianapolis currently has 12 seminarians studying at Saint Meinrad.

The Seminary and School of Theology offers several programs to meet the ministerial needs of the Church. Men preparing for the priesthood pursue the Master of Divinity degree and Master of Arts (Catholic Philosophical Studies). Ongoing formation for priests is offered through the Institute of Priests and Presbyterates.

Men and women who are seeking to serve the Church as lay ministers study for the Master of Arts (Theology). Saint Meinrad also provides a Permanent Deacon Formation Program to 12 dioceses and offers year-round retreats for those looking for spiritual nourishment.

Each summer, hundreds of high school youth, college interns, and adult ministers participate in the "One Bread, One Cup" conferences. They learn more about their Catholic faith and develop skills they can use when they return to their home parishes.

Today the monastic community of about 70 priests and brothers serves the Catholic Church in a variety of ways. Besides their work in the Seminary and School of Theology, monks are serving as chaplains, as faculty at other institutions, and at parishes in several dioceses.

Located in southern Indiana, a mile south of I-64 between exits 72 and 63, Saint Meinrad is less than three hours from Indianapolis. Visitors are always welcome at Saint Meinrad Archabbey.
