



### Pastor's Corner

Dear brothers and sisters of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish:

St. Thomas Aquinas, who gave us the completed concept of transubstantiation (and apt theological explanation of the Real Presence, according to the Council of Trent), was a deep lover of the Eucharist. In his genius, he composed the "Lauda Sion" sequence that can be sung on the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ.

As we celebrate that Feast this weekend, and begin the Eucharistic Revival here in the United States, I offer the text of this venerable song for our prayer and reflection.

Sion, lift thy voice and sing: Praise thy Savior and thy King; Praise with hymns thy Shepherd true: Dare thy most to praise Him well; For He doth all praise excel; None can ever reach His due.

Special theme of praise is thine, That true living Bread divine, That life-giving flesh adored, Which the brethren twelve received, As most faithfully believed, At the Supper of the Lord.

Let the chant be loud and high; Sweet and tranquil be the joy Felt to-day in every breast; On this festival divine Which recounts the origin Of the glorious Eucharist.

At this table of the King,
Our new Paschal offering
Brings to end the olden rite;
Here, for empty shadows fled,
Is reality instead;
Here, instead of darkness, light.

His own act, at supper seated, Christ ordained to be repeated, In His memory divine; Wherefore now, with adoration, We the Host of our salvation Consecrate from bread and wine.

Hear what holy Church maintaineth, That the bread its substance changeth Into Flesh, the wine to Blood. Doth it pass thy comprehending? Faith, the law of sight transcending, Leaps to things not understood.

Here in outward signs are hidden Priceless things, to sense forbidden; Signs, not things, are all we see:-Flesh from bread, and Blood from wine; Yet is Christ, in either sign, All entire confessed to be. They too who of Him partake Sever not, nor rend, nor break, But entire their Lord receive. Whether one or thousands eat, All receive the selfsame meat, Nor the less for others leave.

Both the wicked and the good Eat of this celestial Food; But with ends how opposite! Here 'tis life; and there 'tis death; The same, yet issuing to each In a difference infinite.

Nor a single doubt retain,
When they break the Host in twain,
But that in each part remains
What was in the whole before;
Since the simple sign alone
Suffers change in state or form,
The Signified remaining One
And the Same forevermore

Lo! upon the Altar lies, Hidden deep from human eyes, Angels' Bread from Paradise Made the food of mortal man: Children's meat to dogs denied; In old types foresignified; In the manna from the skies, In Isaac, and the Paschal Lamb.

Jesu! Shepherd of the sheep!
Thy true flock in safety keep.
Living Bread! Thy life supply;
Strengthen us, or else we die;
Fill us with celestial grace:
Thou, who feedest us below!
Source of all we have or know!
Grant that with Thy Saints above,
Sitting at the Feast of Love,
We may see Thee face to face. Amen

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### A Letter from Archabbot Kurt Stasiak, OSB

I write to you just as the summer season gets into full swing. I wish I could say that all is well with the world, but I know you could certainly argue that point. Here in America we're not facing war in the same way the Ukrainians and Russians are, but our country continues to collect a few more battle scars as each year goes by.

Politically, Democrats and Republicans target each other for our country's difficulties, both parties determined to destroy the other in the mid-term elections. Legislatively, rights of gun owners and the right to so-called "reproductive freedom" are only two of the battlegrounds in which apparently no prisoners are welcome.

And when it comes to living a long and healthy life, while we've made some progress on protecting ourselves from COVID, our society continues to suffer from a pandemic of mass shootings in schools, grocery stores, and the neighborhood - a pandemic in which neither masks nor vaccines offer any protection.

I wish I - or someone, anyone - had a solution to even one of these crises. I pray, and I pray especially for those who suffer far more and far worse than our communities here on the hill. So many problems and so few answers! Where can we learn, what do we need to learn, about what so often seems to be the "game of life"? I admit I may be trapped in my own field of dreams here, but let me tell you what I have learned about living with others from one of the best "schools of life" I ever attended: baseball.

The game was supposedly invented by Abner Doubleday in 1839, although many fans scoff at that claim. No matter. Baseball has been around all my life - and the lives of anyone reading this. Not all of us may be players, but almost all of us have enough familiarity with the game that, with a little reflection, we can still field some of the lessons about life baseball can offer us. A game is nine innings, and so let me throw nine ideas your way.

- **1. Don't rest on your laurels.** Yes, you may have hit a two-run homer in the fourth inning to put your team ahead. But that doesn't absolve you from doing your best over the course of the next five innings. And if the opposing team comes from behind to win, *that's* what the people will remember not your early-inning home run. So keep your sights on the goals of your team, not just your own.
- **2. Don't be discouraged when at first you don't succeed.** So you struck out in the first inning with the bases loaded. You may well have another chance in the third inning, or in the fifth or seventh, and again.... And if you do win the game with a single in the bottom of the ninth, who's going to remember (or care) that you struck out in the first?
- **3. Don't let your personality get in the way of your performance.** You and the shortstop or first baseman don't have to be the best of friends (or even like each other, for that matter), but you do need to be teammates. If you're an infielder, they are your guys, and you need to be able to turn a double play with them.
- **4.** No matter your statistics, don't strike out when it comes to sharing the victory. Every pitcher dreams about throwing a perfect game. And every "real" baseball fan can tell you that in October 1956 New York Yankee Don Larsen pitched the only perfect game in World Series history. But what is often overlooked but I'm sure not by Don Larsen himself is that in that perfect game Larsen struck out only seven batters. That's not bad ... but it means that Larsen pitched his perfect game not because *he struck out seven*, but because *his teammates fielded the ball perfectly for the other 20 outs in the game*. If you win, you can afford to share the credit.

- **5. Play fair.** What's the good of making it to the World Series if history remembers you (well over a hundred years later) as the team that threw the games? What's the good of winning the World Series when fans will learn you violated accepted standards of practice and sportsmanship in stealing signals? Where's your place in baseball history when there will always be talk that so many of those allegedly recordbreaking home runs were milked along by illegal performance-enhancing drugs?
- **6.** Remember that when they're cheering your teammate, they're not booing you! The Old Testament story of Cain and Abel is the earliest account we have of humankind's wrestling with emotions such as envy, jealousy and hurt feelings. We love it, understandably, when the crowd cheers us on because we've gotten a hit, driven in a run, or made a spectacular catch. And it's good when, back in the dugout, our teammates surround us with pats on the back and high fives. So why do we find it so hard at times to acknowledge the successes of others *even when they 're on our own team?* How sad it is and how unnecessary when we interpret the praise given to others as somehow taking something away from us!
- **7. Ballparks aren't created equally.** Or, we could say, "there will always be plenty of excuses or others to blame. "The sun was in my eyes." "The umpire needed glasses." "The noise from the crowd was too distracting." "The crowd was too quiet, not cheering me on enough!" "If we had been playing at that other park my fly ball would have been a home run." In his *Rule for Monks*, St. Benedict wrote about "12 degrees of humility." There is no doubt a much longer list of "degrees of excuses."
- **8.** An ordinary game lasts nine innings. So, play for all you're worth during that time. But when the game is over, let it be over. Forget about your strikeouts and errors. Don't get carried away by your towering home runs and amazing catches. Forgive the umpires who are also trying to do their best, knowing that a whole lot of people and at least one of the teams playing aren't going to be satisfied with their every call. Don't curse the pitcher who hit you unless you bless the pitcher who threw that beautiful fast ball right down the middle that you could not help but blast over the fence.
- **9. Finally, keep your perspective.** When you're taking that victory lap around the bases after your home run, or even when you've won the pennant and are pouring champagne on each other in the clubhouse, remember that among those applauding your performance that day are men and women of all ages who, when they're not watching you play, work as firefighters, law enforcement officers, doctors, nurses, paramedics, members of our Armed Forces, farmers, janitors, plumbers, secretaries, cooks and so many others upon whom we depend for such things as health, safety, food, protection, life, and the smooth running of society. When do they hear us applaud them? There are heroes on the baseball field, to be sure. But let's take the time and bother to recognize and applaud the diamonds off the field as well.

Life isn't a game, of course. But even though baseball is a game for most of us, it offers us important lessons and attitudes that foster growth, virtue, satisfaction, and harmony with those with whom we work and live. So, consider these somewhat tongue-in-cheek suggestions from my own field of dreams on how to live, as the New Testament put it, in season and out of season (2 Timothy 4:2).

Now: let's go out and play ball! And may God's good Spirit guide us to a field that is level and smooth.
